


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The value of Pell

The maximum Pell Grant covers about half of the total cost of attending a public two-year institution, compared to nearly 100 percent some 35 years ago.

In 2013-14, the maximum federal Pell Grant was \$5,645, with community college students on average receiving \$3,227. About 40 percent of community college students received Pell grants, which represented \$11 billion, or 36 percent, of the total program. Although community colleges offer lower tuition than four-year public institutions, Pell grants often don't cover other costs of attendance, such as books, supplies, transportation and housing. The maximum Pell Grant awarded at community colleges covered 52 percent of the average total cost of attendance in 2013-14, down from 62 percent three years earlier.
