

Cost of college

Community college tuition and fees remain the lowest of all sectors in higher education.

Community colleges continue to offer the lowest tuition and fees across all sectors of higher education. In 2016-17, the average estimate of full-time cost for a student to attend a community college was \$17,000, which included an average \$3,520 for tuition, \$8,060 for room and board, \$1,390 for books and supplies, \$1,760 for transportation and \$2,270 for other expenses. (Students often pay much less than the "sticker price" after student aid and other benefits are factored in.) Community colleges had a 1.7 percent average annual increase (inflation-adjusted) in tuition and fees compared to the previous year. Tuition and mandatory fees represent only 21 percent of the cost of community college students who live off campus. At public four-year institutions, they account for 39 percent of the total cost of \$24,610. Read more.
